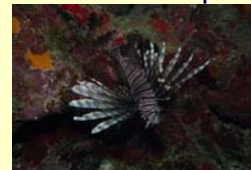

Did faulty cement prime Deepwater Horizon for blowout?

A failed cement plug and ignored warning signs could have contributed to the blowout of an exploration well in the Gulf of Mexico Deep-water oil spills do their damage deep down

Surface slicks may account for as little as 2 per cent of the oil now spilling into the Gulf of Mexico. The study challenges the estimate by federal officials, based on the amount of oil on the sea surface, that around 5000 barrels (800 cubic metres) of oil per day are pouring into the sea from the site where the BP-operated drilling rig Deepwater Horizon was destroyed by fire last month. It also adds weight to reports of massive underwater oil plumes that government officials are now downplaying.

**The Diving Rebels in Blue Water**  
**Panama City Beach, Florida**  
**May 21 -24, 2010**

Arlington began fading into the rearview mirror about 1:45 Friday afternoon. Those of us working managed to get off early and we were on the road earlier than originally planned. We arrived at the hotel a little less than 14 hours later. The trip was pretty uneventful other than a detour for I-12 being closed outside of Baton Rouge that forced us through New Orleans.

Along with some cat naps along the road, we managed anywhere from 1.5 hours to 3 hours sleep after arriving. Then it was diving time. We dove with Dive Locker and they it was a good operation. There were 11 Saturday and 7 Sunday on a boat that could have held about 25 so we had plenty of space.

The visibility was about 20 - 50 feet depending on location and time and temps around 72 at depth. The wind was calm and the seas flat the entire weekend.

The first dive was a bridge span and was typical Florida diving with plenty of fish and sea cucumbers. After a couple of trips around we did a little excursion which was a challenge. We moved away from the span to the South while facing and slightly kicking toward the East. We made a box end and then travelled back towards the span. A little miscalculation for my buddy's air caused us to free ascend about 20 yards out from the boat and the anchor line we were supposed to come up. The next dive was on a tug and it yielded what I considered one of the best dives. There was a huge grouper hanging out in the room under the wheel house. Topside they said 500 pounds but the fisher folk of Diving Rebels thought more like 300. In any case, it was big, about 5 ft long and 3.5 tall and probably 1.5 thick. We swam through the rooms and around the interior. Lunch was about 2:30 by the time we got air refills and visited at the shop. There were oysters galore. The bed called some afterward, yet the beach, sunset and dancing lured one of us out.

We were back at the dive shop the next morning and off to dive the "hard bottom." That's their term for natural reef. This was shaped like a horseshoe. However it was failed to be mentioned that one should only go half way around it. Well we Rebels did the whole thing and when we ran out of reef, we surfaced. That was about 300 yards from the boat. The seas were so flat it was like being in a lake, after signaling our OK and talking with those on the boat (it was so quiet we didn't even have to shout), we started back swimming toward the boat while they weighed anchor and came for the retrieval. That's one we'll talk about for a while.

Ray packed us sandwich stuff so lunch was during the surface interval rather than so late. Our last boat dive was on a hover craft that is supposed to be home to lobster. We didn't see any and the dive was unimpressive. We actually took a moment to stand on the bottom out of the current and that turned into a funny episode of diver settling down on a diver. We all got a laugh.

We squeezed in a shore dive along the jetties at St. Andrews Park, the most recommended spot by locals and frequent visitors. There was a school of fish whizzing by at what seemed 90 miles an hour. Visibility was about 15 - 20ft with a decent current with the outgoing tide. Nothing we could not handle.

Dinner was at Sharky's next door to the hotel and was delicious, the company excellent and the band, Latitude 29, great. We all agreed, having one more day would have been nice.

We set sail in the quad-cab bright and early Monday morning and made it back in 14 hours with a nice stop just West of Baton Rouge at a Cajun café for lunch. All in all, it was a very good trip. However, I think the consensus was that South Padre in Sept was the better when compared.
